# UNIVERSAL SCHOOL MEALS

his legislative session I have joined advocates in working to make sure that no child goes hungry at school. Over the course of the pandemic, universal school meals were made available to all students regardless of income. Last year, then-Governor Tom Wolf extended the universal breakfast program only for school year 2022-2023. This session I joined Senator Judy Schwank and Representative Emily Kinkead in introducing a **Universal School Meal bill** that makes universal breakfast and lunch permanent and seeks to eliminate school meal debt. Governor Josh Shapiro's proposed budget to the General Assembly included the funding for universal breakfast, which is less than 1% of the total proposed budget. Removing any barriers that exist between our students and access to food is important to me. School meals should be treated as fundamental, just like textbooks, in our schools. We know that kids are not fully prepared to learn or behave in the classroom if their stomach is empty. I've heard from so many parents who are grateful for the continuation of school breakfast because it keeps costs down at home and eliminates shame. I want to work toward a future where our students not only have access to meals, but access to fresh, locally grown and supported meals from farmers in their backyard.

## **WORKERS ARE THE KEY TO RAIL SAFETY**

he February 3 train derailment in East Palestine, Ohio, just minutes from the Pennsylvania border, has put a spotlight on rail safety. After several hearings, including one with Pennsylvania residents affected by the accident and one with Norfolk Southern CEO Alan Shaw, I remain incredibly concerned about safety-particularly whether workers on these trains are able to slow down or stop an unsafe train without permission from a supervisor. These workers are in the best position to be able to stop a derailment and they should be able to exercise their judgment without fear of retaliation.

Thank you to the members of the Association of Pennsylvania State College and University Faculties for naming me as your Distinguished Friend of Higher Education this year. Supporting the hard work that APSCUF members do as educators and coaches is one of my highest priorities, so I'm proud to receive this honor.

The last few years have been incredibly difficult in PA State System of Higher Education (PASSHE), but the professors and coaches at these universities have repeatedly risen to the occasion and fought for their students and for one another. I'm proud to continue to ask the hard questions and push for what we all know that students need to be successful.




I am absolutely honored to be named their Distinguished Friend-- I can think of no better company to keep than by the side of APSCUF members.

During the hearing with Mr. Shaw, he was unable to tell me if workers are able to make these calls, and that is a big problem. A culture of safety and prioritizing workers starts from the top.

Train tracks like the ones that run through East Palestine, Ohio run throughout Senate District 38—through our neighborhoods, near our schools, and too close to our rivers for comfort. Less than a year ago, an accident at a crossing in Harmar Township caused a 17-car derailment. Nine of those cars fell into Deer Creek at the mouth of the Allegheny River.

than 3,000 gallons of petroleum distillate leaked into our waterways during that incident. Regular derailments at the expense of our communities cannot be just another cost of doing business—we demand better.



# **SBUX RISING**

n January, I joined local labor leaders and members of the striking Pittsburgh Post-Gazette Writers' Guild in support of the Starbucks United workers ahead of their long-awaited trial against Starbucks for Unfair Labor Practices. Since the Starbucks unionizing efforts began nationwide, 11 locations in Pittsburgh have unionized—more than anywhere else in the country. I'm proud to stand with these workers fighting for a more democratic and equitable workplace.

# JOINT POLICY HEARING ON SUPPORTIVE EDUCATION FOR NEURODIVERGENT STUDENTS

n April 14, Rep. Jess Benham and I co-hosted a joint Senate and House Democratic Caucus Policy Committee Hearing on supportive education for neurodivergent students. This hearing focused on how we can create public schools that are affirming, inclusive, safe educational environments for all students, especially those with ADHD, Autism, Intellectual Disabilities, PTSD, Learning Disabilities, Epilepsy, Generalized Anxiety Disorder, and other diagnoses. I'm incredibly grateful for the students and parents who took the time to speak with us about their lived experiences. We often only hear from experts at these hearings, but it's important to also hear the perspectives of neurodivergent students and parents directly impacted by our decisions as legislators. Testifying at a public hearing can be incredibly overwhelming, so I appreciate how much work went into preparing and sharing their stories with all of us—and I want them all to know how impactful their words were. I'm committed to working on legislation and policy that will provide our students with the resources that they need to thrive.


